HOUSING OFFICER, DIRECTOR OF ADMISSIONS NAMED

Two new administrative appointments were announced this week. Ken Jacob, director of residence halls for the University of Washington since 1970, has been named housing officer, and Kenneth B. Mayer, currently director of admissions for Pacific University at Forest Grove, Oregon, has been named to a similar post at Evergreen.

Jacob, 34, has worked in the University's residence halls programs since 1964. An army veteran, he has also worked as a student loan officer at Oregon State University and as a graduate assistant in the OSU Dean of Men's Office. He received his doctorate in applied behavioral science from Union Graduate School, Yellow Spring, Ohio, and both his bachelor's and master's degrees from OSU. He will replace Kathy Williams, who is leaving Evergreen today for her new home in San Francisco, where she plans to be married September 9 to Michael Kyte, a consulting engineer in transportation.

Mayer, a graduate of the University of California at Berkeley, has served as admissions director at Pacific University for the past two years. He has also served as Pacific's associate dean of admissions and as a high school counselor, a curriculum assistant to a California high school principal and as a high school teacher.

Four other administrative posts --- Registrar, Director of Development, Legislative Liaison Officer and Dean of Library Services --- are expected to be filled within the next few months.

DANCERS IN MOTION FRIDAY

Thirty student dancers will present two performances of "Dancing in Motion," today at 2 and 7 p.m. in the multipurpose room of the College Recreation Center. Admission is free. The performances will be under the direction of Faculty Member Bud Johanson, and will culminate the students' summer workshop in dance. Ballet, character, modern, and jazz dances will be featured.

TACOMA FIRM WINS LABORATORY CONTRACT

Jones and Roberts Company of Tacoma has submitted the apparent low bid of \$3,525,000 for construction of the second phase of the Laboratory Building. The 81,000-square-foot, three-story structure will be a near replica of and will attach to the first phase of the Lab building, which opened earlier this year. The new building --- like the one now in use --- will include conference and classrooms, faculty offices and laboratories for the arts and sciences. Work on the structure is scheduled to begin immediately and is expected to be completed by mid-1975.

LIBRARY HOURS CHANGING

The Evergreen library will only be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. next week, and will be closed to public access for the following two weeks (September 5-14), according to Dave Carnahan, associate dean of library services. The two-week closure will enable the library staff to work on collection verification and on what Carnahan describes as "some rather large filing functions." The library will be open for public use again September 17 on an 8 a.m.-to-5 p.m. schedule.
