...INTERNS ASSIGNED TO VARIETY OF TASKS THROUGHOUT THE STATE...The Office of Cooperative Education has placed more than 80 students throughout the State of Washington in a wide variety of assignments. As might be expected, the largest number of students, 26, is assigned in the Olympia-Lacey-Tumwater area. An additional six interns are working on campus in Students Services, Recreation and Campus Activities, and Accounting Services.

The second largest impact area for Evergreen interns is Seattle with 17 students assigned to schools, department stores, environmental planning agencies, doctors' offices, day nurseries, hospitals, and the Rainier Brewing Company.

Other cities with interns include: Tacoma, 9; Wenatchee, 3; Bellevue, 3; Everett, 2; Vancouver, Wash., 2; and one each in Shelton, Montesano, Kelso, Puyallup, Longview, Richland, Bremerton, Brinnon, Randle, and Chinook. Four students are completing internships in California, two in New York, two in Oregon, two in Illinois and one in Pennsylvania.

...TRUSTEES APPROVE SIX MILLION DOLLAR REQUEST...Evergreen's Board of Trustees has voted to request state appropriation of a \$6,523,872 supplemental capital construction budget and a \$289,318 supplemental operating budget for the 1974-75 academic year. Both requests will be forwarded to the Office of Program Planning and Fiscal Management for possible referral to the 1974 special session of the State Legislature.


The capital request, which includes \$5,720,180 from the State General Fund and \$1,032,000 in college-generated revenues, would finance construction of a 77,561-square-foot Communications Laboratory Building, which will house theaters, practice rooms, studios, dressing and rehearsal rooms. If approved, the new facility --- already designed through previous legislative appropriations --- would open in Fall Quarter 1976.

The proposed supplemental operating proposal would provide funds to finance a companion request that Evergreen's 1974-75 academic year enrollment be increased from the budgeted 1973-74 figure of 2,050 to 2,200. The supplemental operating funds would allow the hiring of eight additional faculty members and provide for increased operations --- all tied to the proposed enrollment increase --- in such areas as general administration, student services, library and plant operations.

...NO HUNTING ON CAMPUS... In another action, the Board of Trustees approved a resolution declaring Evergreen off limits for the discharge of firearms and directing college personnel to post no trespassing signs around the 1,000-acre campus. The action was requested after Security personnel reported discovering the remains of a slaughtered deer on campus. They also indicated they have had to ask armed hunters to leave college property on several occasions. The no trespassing restrictions were imposed because of fears for the safety of the more than 2,500 persons who study and work at Evergreen.

...PHYSICS PROFESSORS TO MEET ON CAMPUS NOV. 10...Members of the Washington Section of the American Association of Physics Teachers will gather for an all-day meeting on campus November 10. Some 60 persons from high schools, colleges and universities are expected to attend a morning session on the energy crisis and an afternoon program discussing the sciences at Evergreen. The meeting is being coordinated by Interim Dean Byron Youtz and will be held in Lecture Hall Five.

...THE PEOPLE SHOW PERFORMS MONDAY NIGHT...The People Show, England's oldest experimental theater group, will perform at Evergreen November 5 at 8:30 p.m. in Lecture Hall One. Five actors comprise the People Show, one of the best known avante-garde companies in Europe. The performers create their own shows, which they do not refer to as "plays" because they do not begin with a script. Each new show is a combination of the actor's own ideas and each performance is planned, but not rehearsed, so that the performers are free to improvise. The performance is sponsored by Eye-5, which is requesting a \$3 contribution to help defray Eye-5 operating expenses. Tickets will be available at the door.

...JAZZ MUSICIAN SCHEDULES TWO CONCERTS NOV. 9...Walter Zuber Armstrong, jazz musician, composer and arranger, will present two FREE performances at Evergreen November 9 in the fourth floor section of the library building. Armstrong, a frequent music lecturer at Western Washington State College, has scheduled appearances at 8 and 9:30 p.m. A student of the Juilliard School of Music, the New York College of Music and Toronto's Royal Conservatory, he has performed all along the West Coast, and last year visited the Olympia area --- and Evergreen --- under Eye-5 sponsorship.

...CREATIVE JAPANESE FOLDING COURSE OPENS...A one-credit course in Origami, the Japanese art of paper folding, begins November 5 at Evergreen. The program, taught by Faculty Member Richard Alexander, is offered to part-time students from the Olympia area as well as full-time Evergreeners. The newest of Evergreen's modular courses, the one-credit program is equivalent to four quarter hours of credit, Alexander said. Course work includes creation of advanced and creative folds, to be made into animals, birds, human figures, puppets, hats and abstract decorations and "should be particularly useful for art students and elementary and junior high teachers," he added.
