EVERGREEN WINS TWO MORE GRANTS

Evergreen has been awarded two grants totaling more than \$34,000 by the Office of Education, Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The first grant, awarded to the Office of Cooperative Education, is for \$30,000 to expand and strengthen the Co-Op internship program. The second award, totaling \$4,235, will provide funds for the College Library Resources Program.

Co-Op Director Ken Donohue said the \$30,000 award will help improve the internship program which last year placed more than 570 students in credit-generating jobs in government, business, education, industry and social service agencies.

Malcolm Stilson, Evergreen acquisitions librarian and project director for the Library Resources program said the \$4,235 will provide funds for purchase of resource materials in three main areas: ethnic studies, self-paced learning units for the educationally disadvantaged, and environmental and ecological studies.

INTER-CITY TRANSIT TO PROVIDE BUS SERVICE

The Inter-City Transit Commission has contracted with Evergreen to provide bus service to the campus during the 1974-75 academic year, according to John Moss, director of auxiliary services.

The new service will begin September 24, with seven runs each weekday and four runs on Saturdays. Fare for the Inter-City service will be 15¢ for persons with TESC identification cards; 25¢ for others. Transfers are free.

The new service will not include night runs to campus. But, Moss said, Evergreen will develop night runs "with college equipment and college personnel" sometime after Fall Quarter begins.

FIVE GRANTED PROFESSIONAL LEAVES

Associate Library Dean Dave Carnahan and four Evergreen faculty members --- Carrie Cable, Stan Klyn, Bob Sluss and Fred Young --- have been granted professional leaves during the 1974-75 academic year. The leaves are the first ever granted under a Professional Leaves Policy approved by the Board of Trustees last winter.

Carnahan, who served as acting dean of the library during the 1973-74 academic year, will take leave from February 1 to August 1 next year to identify effective ways of measuring and evaluating the value of college library services. He expects to travel throughout the West Coast.

Sluss and Young will take leaves both Fall and Winter Quarters: Young to study European cathedral design from early Romanesque to Baroque and to examine the art and architecture of the Renaissance; Sluss to study invertebrate pathology, particularly around Evergreen, and to develop knowledge of geology and ornithology of the Northwest.

Cable and Klyn will take their leaves Spring Quarter. Klyn will study contemporary art of southern and southeastern Europe, while Cable will return to Japan to study Japanese hand weaving and dyeing.

BUDGET DIRECTORS PREPARE FOR JULY 19 HEARING

It's budget time at Evergreen. Deans and Directors can be seen mulling over long sheets of figures, erasures in hand, as they prepare for the President's budget hearing set for September 16. Their budgets, like most of ours at home, are stretched tightly by the increasingly wide ring of inflation.

Some examples of cost increases which face budgetary wizards this time of year include the cost of milk, which has tripled since last July. Flour has gone from \$8.72 to \$20 per 100 pounds, while sugar has gone from \$13.94 to \$33.91 per 100 pounds. Gasoline, a real bargain at 19¢ per gallon 18 months ago, now costs the college 46¢ per gallon. Even steam, which sold for \$1 a ton last July now sells for \$1.50 per ton, and electricity has jumped from 54¢ to 68.5¢ per kilowatt hour during the past year.

One thing has stayed the same this year --- and probably will until December, according to Auxiliary Services Director John Moss. The cost of a 10¢ candy bar is still only 15¢. But, Moss says, come the first of the year, the 10¢ bar will cost 25¢. The vendors aren't even going to bother with an intermediate charge of 20¢. Start saving your quarters...and next time you see some budget unit heads conferring, give them a smile. They need it right now.
