Program Description

Fall Quarter 1984

During this first quarter, the Political Ecology program began studies of general ecology, human ecology, and social science plus weekly exercises in writing, reading, public speaking and critical analysis. Using local examples to illustrate global resource-concepts, the program focused upon ecological and cultural aspects of Northwest timber and salmon resources and their history. Weekly field exercises, with systematic site observations and compilation of a Field Journal complemented lectures on basic principles of ecology. Students interviewed representatives of local resource-oriented industries and wrote ethnography papers as a way of integrating principles with practice. A final synthesis of program issues and themes was made via an extensive written exercise near the quarter's end.

Winter Quarter 1985

During the second (and final) quarter, the Political Ecology program continued the studies of general ecology, human ecology, and social science. The local regional resource topics this quarter were agriculture, shellfish harvest and aquaculture, and Puget Sound's water quality. Two special projects were students' observational studies of Washington State's Legislature and legislative process, and students' research on selected resource issues or other environmental topics. Weekly ecological field and laboratory exercises and an ecological report were directed to freshwater and marine environments. Other weekly activities included a theme lecture, ecology lecture, book seminar, social science methods seminar (the Washington Legislature project), and research seminar.

A special campus-wide event to promote intercultural understanding held during one week was about the acculturation of Southeast Asian refugees in the United States. It included a film <u>Becoming American</u>, a lecture and performance by Dwight Conquergood (Northwestern University) on "We Never Forget: Stories From Southeast Asian Refugee Cultures", and a panel discussion and food ceremonies conducted by Conquergood and local Southeast Asian refugees.
