Nebraska Is Super Cool

(and more liberal than you think) Other States are totally stupid, and Nebraska is awesome because it uses the School-based Teacher-led Assessment and Reporting System (STARS), which totally beats the WASL. STARS rocks because it:

- is a system of local assessments, not a state test.
- requires multiple measures of student performance.
- requires documentation of assessment quality.
- uses reflective classroom-based assessments (CBA) for state reporting.
- includes NO high-state tests.
- sponsors connections.
- promotes teacher involvement and professional growth
- is student-focused
- is inclusive
- is a validation of the teaching professional
- inspires ownership and pride in teachers

STARS monitors Annual Yearly Progress (AYP) through District Assessment Portfolios (DAPs) which must meet the Six Quality Criteria (QCs):

- 1. Assessments align to state or local standards
- 2. Students have an opportunity to learn the content
- 3. Assessments are free from bias or offensive language
- 4. The level is developmentally appropriate for students
- 5. There is consistency in scoring
- 6. The Mastery levels are appropriate to subject and grade
