How To Use This Brochure

Evergreen Swingshift is designed to inform you about part-time study opportunities Spring Quarter 1979 at The Evergreen State College, and to outline other basic information about the college and its registration process.

The "Table of Contents" is your key to finding the information you need. Prospective students are also asked to read about and to attend the *Academic Fair*, described on this page.

Academic Fair

Evergreen will hold two one-day *Academic Fairs* in connection

with registration for Spring Quarter 1979. The *Academic Fair* is your opportunity to look over the college and its programs and to register for the offerings of your choice. You may attend the *Academic Fair* on:

Wednesday, March 7, 1979.

Persons interested in full-time study (3 or 4 Evergreen Units) come from 1-3 p.m.; part-time students (1 or 2 Evergreen Units) come from 5:30-7 p.m., first floor lobby, Evans Library, campus. The *Academic Fair* will be repeated on:

Wednesday, March 28, 1979 (the first day of classes, Spring Quarter) for those who were not able to attend the earlier event. Times will be the same as for the March 7 Fair.

You are urged to attend one of these events as enrollment for programs and courses is on a first-come, first-served basis and the more popular offerings fill quickly. Call the Registrar's office, 866-6180, if you have questions about enrollment.

Spring Calendar

Spring Quarter 1979 begins Wednesday, March 28 and ends Friday, June 8, 1979. The Quarter includes one holiday, Monday, May 28, for observation of Memorial Day. See the sections titled *Academic Fair* and *Registration* for important dates related to enrollment for Spring Quarter.

Registration

Students need not apply for regular admission to Evergreen in order to take the part-time studies listed in this brochure. You may register for these offerings one of three ways:

- 1) At the *Academic Fairs* on March 7 or 28 (see page one for details);
- 2) By completing the *Special Student Registration Form* (page 11 this brochure) and returning it to the Registrar's office no later than April 4; or
- 3) by *registering in person* March 29, 9 a.m. - 7 p.m., or March 30-April 4, 9 a.m. - 5 p.m.

April 4 (the sixth day of classes) is the deadline for registration and payment of fees for Spring Quarter. Those registering after this day will be subject to late payment charges.

Quarter Offerings

Spring Quarter Part-Time Studies are divided into Arts, Humanities, Natural Science, and Social Science. The category of Natural Science also includes Mathematics and Computer Science.

Titles listed under more than one heading are followed by an asterisk (*). Although most items offered are for 1 Evergreen Unit of credit, there are a few exceptions, so please note the credit for each item of interest to you.

See the section on **Registration** to find out how to enroll in Evergreen part-time studies. Questions about part-time studies should be forwarded to the appropriate instructor or to Registrar's office, 866-6180.

Costs

Residents of Washington state pay \$83 for 1 Evergreen Unit, \$123 for 2 Evergreen Units of credit. These prices apply to *regular students*, (i.e., degree-seeking), *special students* (non-degree seeking) and Southeast Asia Veterans.

Non-Residents pay \$265 for 1 Evergreen Unit and \$396 for 2 Evergreen Units of credit, whether regular or special students.

All special students are exempt from paying the \$50 advance payment on tuition required by the college.

Auditors (a student seeking no credit for the course) pay \$25 per item registered for. Auditors must have faculty approval before registering.

Tuesday, Thursday, 1 - 2:30 p.m., *Communications Building 107 (Recital Hall)*.
This is the last part of a three-quarter acting sequence with emphasis on characterization and period styles. Students are expected to present three in-class scenes.

Prerequisites: Intermediate acting or equivalent.
Class size limit: 15. No auditors.

ARCHITECTURAL DRAWING*

Course (1 Evergreen Unit).
Jon Collier, Adjunct Member of the Faculty (Architecture), 866-6180.
Thursdays, 5:30 - 8:30 p.m., *Lecture Hall Two*.
Course will cover methods of presenting three-dimensional design projects in graphic form, including sketching, one and two-point perspectives, isometrics, preliminary and working drawings.
Drafting supplies and textbooks will cost approximately \$20.

Prerequisites: None.
Class size limit: 24. No auditors.

ARTIST'S PORTFOLIO

Course offers instruction in the design, development and use of an artist's portfolio. The emphasis each week will be on different portfolio components. *Special expenses will run up to \$25 per student.*

Class size limit: 15. Auditors allowed.

BEGINNING DANCE II: BALLET AND MODERN

Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, 4:30 - 6 p.m., *Recreation Center 307*.
An introduction to basic ballet and modern dance technique, this course is a continuation of Winter Quarter Beginning Dance. New students accepted.

Prerequisites: One quarter of dance or equivalent.
Class size limit: 24. No auditors.

BEGINNING MODERN DANCE II

Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, 3:30 - 5 p.m., *Communications Building 210*.
This course offers basic skill development and basic concepts of modern dance. The class will consist of technique and reading assignments.

Prerequisites: One quarter modern dance or ballet.
Class size limit: 14. No auditors

CLASS PIANO

A continuation of piano study to develop proficiency in sight reading, transposition, harmonization, and analysis through study of music fundamentals and playing selected repertoire.

Prerequisites: Two quarters of Class Piano or equivalent. Instructor's signature required for new students.
Class size limit: 12. No auditors.

CLAYWORKS I

Thursdays, 6 - 10 p.m., *Laboratory I Annex*.
This is introduction to clay. We will create functional ware and sculptural forms using basic techniques and a variety of firing processes.

CLAYWORKS II

Thursdays, 1 - 5 p.m., *Laboratory I Annex*.
Students will build on their previous experience in clay. Class time will be used for slides, discussion and demonstrations, so be prepared to work outside of class.

Prerequisites: Instructor's signature.
Class size limit: 18.

COLOR PHOTOGRAPHY

Wednesdays, 6 - 10 p.m., *Library 1334* (Photo Services).
Color Photography is an exploration of the uses and meaning of color in photographic imagery and includes instruction on the techniques and materials used in making color photographs. *Costs will run about three times as much as for black and white materials.*

Prerequisites: Intermediate or advanced photographic and darkroom skills.
Class size limit: 20. No auditors.

EVERGREEN CHAMBER ORCHESTRA

Monday, 4 - 6 p.m., *Library 2114*; and Thursday, 7 - 9 p.m., *Communication Building 110* (Orchestra Rehearsal and Recital Hall).
This ensemble, to be composed mostly of strings, will perform music of the baroque and classical eras.

Prerequisites: Performance ability on violin, viola or cello. Audition or instructor's signature required.
Class size limit: 30. Auditors accepted (and need only attend Thursday sessions).

EVERGREEN SINGERS (CHOIR)

Tuesday, Thursday, 4 - 6 p.m., *Communication Building 117* (Choir Room).
The choir will prepare music representing a variety of musical styles for several public performances. These will be opportunities for solos and small ensembles, in addition to large choral works.

Prerequisites: Instructor's signature.
Class size limit: 24. Only students already enrolled in 4 Evergreen Units of study will be permitted to audit.

FILM AS A CULTURAL DOCUMENT*

Mondays, 4 - 6:30 p.m., *Communications Building 107* (Recital Hall).
We will examine the use of films as interpretations of culture and explore the strategies and methods of the ethnographic filmmaker. Ten weekly sessions will cover screenings, recommended reading, critical essays and discussion.

Prerequisites: None.
Class size limit: 40. Auditors accepted.

IMAGE MAKING: DRAWING

A continuation of the Winter Quarter course, this offers further study into drawing skills and exercises dealing with the imagination process. Some figure drawing will be incorporated.

Class size limit: 18. No auditors.

IMAGE MAKING: PHOTOGRAPHY

Tuesdays, 5:30 - 10 p.m., *Library 1334* (Photo Services).
This course will emphasize the aesthetic and technical aspects of photography so it can be used as a medium of self-expression.

Prerequisites: Basic darkroom skills and instructor's signature.
Class size limit: 20. No auditors.

INTERMEDIATE BALLET

Course (1 Evergreen Unit).

Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, 12 Noon - 1:30 p.m., *Recreation Center 307*.
Intensive study of ballet barre and center techniques will be offered, along with an introduction of point techniques, in this intermediate course. Evaluation is based on personal advancement.

Prerequisites: Audition.
Class size limit: 20. No auditors.

INTRODUCTION TO GRAPHIC DESIGN

Course (1 Evergreen Unit).

Monday, 5:30 - 7 p.m., and Thursday, 5:30 - 7 p.m., *Seminar Building 2150* (Graphics Design).
This is the second part of a two-quarter course dealing with ideas and their translation to visual terms. New students will be admitted. *Costs run about \$40 per person.*

Prerequisites: Previous graphic experience, interview with and signature of instructor.
Class size limit: 12. No auditors.

INTERMEDIATE MODERN DANCE

Course (1 Evergreen Unit).
Sheryl Sedlacek, Adjunct Member of the Faculty (Dance), 322-4184 (Seattle).
Tuesday, Thursday, 12:30 - 3:30 p.m., *Communications Building 210*.
Students will develop awareness of movement, physical strength and coordination of the body and focus on proper body alignment. We will experiment with different elements of time, weight and space and consider ways they are incorporated into movement.

Prerequisites: At least four quarters of modern dance or ballet technique.
Class size limit: 12. No auditors.

JAZZ ARRANGING AND COMPOSITION

Course (1 Evergreen Unit).
Jorgen Kruse, Adjunct Member of the Faculty (Music), 531-3613 (Tacoma).
Monday, Wednesday, Friday, 4 - 5 p.m., *Communications Building 119*.
This course is designed to help the student develop skills in jazz arranging and composition. Vehicles provided include a 17-piece stage band and an experimental quintet. Other vehicles must be assembled by the student or sought out with the help of the instructor. Students will be required to score and record one project. *Cost of required text is \$12.50.*

Prerequisites: Interview with instructor.
Class size limit: 10.

JAZZ LAB

Course (1 Evergreen Unit).

Monday, Wednesday, Friday, 5 - 6:30 p.m., *Communications Building 119*.
Jazz Lab provides the student with a vehicle to develop skills in the jazz idiom and to have the means for publicly expressing jazz music. Students will audition for membership in one of these: 17-piece stage band; five-piece experimental ensemble.

Prerequisites: Audition.
Class size limit: 17.

MEDIA FOR THE UNINITIATED

Course (1 Evergreen Unit).
Susan Smith, Adjunct Member of the Faculty (Evergreen Coordinator of Library Media Services) and Wyatt Cates, Adjunct Member of the Faculty (Evergreen Library Media Staff), 866-6270.
Tuesday, 4 - 6 p.m. (lab), and Thursday, 4 - 6 p.m. (lecture), *Library 1302*.
Instruction in basic audio-visual techniques using Evergreen's media production center. Students will cover the basics of audio recording, audio editing, slide photography, graphic design, and slide/tape production. *Cost for materials, \$25.*

Prerequisites: None.
Class size limit: 15. No auditors.

MODERN TRAINING AIDS

Tuesdays, 7 - 9 p.m., 4-hour lab to be arranged, *Laboratory I, 1065*.
An intense workshop dealing with the production, utilization and evaluation of selected media. The writing of objectives, AV-Graphics, overhead projection, script writing, slide/tapes, product photography, super-8 film, will be studied from the viewpoint of workshop participant's job assignment. The workshop will also stress the production of materials that can be used in present or planned training programs and should result in a completed model project by each workshop participant. *Modern Training Aids* is a prerequisite for programs to be offered in succeeding quarters: advanced training film production, photography, slide/dissolve shows, special training aid projects. *Cost for materials: \$20.*

MUSIC FUNDAMENTALS

Tuesday, Thursday, 1 - 2:30 p.m., *Communications Building 117*.
Class covers elements of time and sound, the notation of pitch, time classifications and time signatures, notation of notes and rests, intervals, scales, and key signatures.

Prerequisites: None.

Class size limit: 24. Auditors accepted.

MUSIC THEORY III

Course (1 Evergreen Unit).

Dr. Greg Steinke, Member of the Faculty (Music), 866-6059.
Tuesday, Thursday, 1 - 2:30 p.m. (class), and Monday, Friday, 1 - 2 p.m. (lab), *Communications Building 320*.

A continuation of Music Theory II, offered Winter Quarter, this class covers use of augmented sixth chords, altered dominants, chromatic mediants and foreign modulation; sight singing; ear training; and some analysis and composition of music.

Prerequisites: Successful completion of Music Theory II or equivalent.
Class size limit: 15. Auditors accepted.

POETRY AND SCIENCE*

Coordinated Study (1 Evergreen Unit).

Dr. Craig Carlson, Member of the Faculty (Communications), 866-6097.

Mondays, 1 - 3 p.m., *Library 2129*.

Students may earn part-time credit in this full-time program by attending lectures and by writing a paper on the art of science and the science of art.

Prerequisites: None.

Class size limit: None.

POET'S PRESS

Course (1 Evergreen Unit).

Rusty North, Adjunct Member of the Faculty (Printing), 866-6003.
Mondays 9 a.m. - 10 p.m. or Tuesdays, 9 a.m. - 12 Noon, *Laboratory II 0233*. (NOTE: Students serve four hours of studio time, during these times.)

Poet's Press offers study and practice in the art of small letterpress printing, with emphasis on giving beautiful form to poetry, design, and the production of one major project. Students will make field trips to view rare book collections and attend workshops.

Prerequisites: None.

Class size limit: 20.

TELEVISION DIRECTING

Course (1 Evergreen Unit).

Wednesday, 1 - 5 p.m.

A course which emphasizes the role of the television producer/director in the studio. Students will write, produce and direct various short productions from within the context of broadcast journalism and television drama (including live coverage).

Prerequisites: Interview with instructor, with portfolio.

Class size limit: 15.

WRITING FOR FILM AND TELEVISION

Course (1 Evergreen Unit).

Tuesday, Thursday, 7 - 9 p.m., *Library 2509*.

A course which will explore the various script formats for television and film including non-fiction production (documentary, educational, public relations), as well as adaptations and original writing for theatrical production. Students will have weekly writing assignments which will be critiqued in the class sessions.

Prerequisites: None.

Class size limit: 24.

AJAX COMPACT*

Coordinated Study (1 Evergreen Unit).

Sandie Nisbet, Adjunct Member of the Faculty (Drama), 866-1830.
Tuesday, Thursday, 12 Noon - 3 p.m., *Laboratory II 2007*.

This course is designed for women returning to school after time away. Discussions focus on the lives of historical and contemporary people who have made changes. Attention is paid to helping students write with ease, read critically, and become familiar with college and community resources.

Prerequisites: None.

Class size limit: 15.

BETWEEN THE COVERS

Course (1 Evergreen Unit).

Frank Motley, Adjunct Member of the Faculty (Evergreen's Head of Library Reference) and Pat Matheny-White, Adjunct Member of the Faculty (Evergreen Coordinator of Library User Services), 866-6250.

Tuesdays, 5:30 - 7:30 p.m., *Library 2300*.

This course provides an overall view of library reference tools to better enable students to search for information they need.

Prerequisites: None.

Class size limit: 20. No Auditors.

CAREER PLANNING AND JOB SEARCH ORIENTATION

Course (1 Evergreen Unit).

Elane Bills, Adjunct Member of the Faculty (Evergreen Career Counselor), 866-6193.

Wednesdays, 5:30 - 8:30 p.m., *Library 1509*.

The focus of this course is values clarification, needs assessment, skills evaluation, resume writing, and interviewing techniques.

Prerequisites: None.

Class size limit: 20. No auditors.

DOING LOCAL AND WOMEN'S HISTORY

Course (1 Evergreen Unit).

Dr. Margaret Gribskov, Member of the Faculty (Journalism/Education), 866-6763.

Mondays, 7 - 10 p.m., Coach House Meeting Room, State Capitol Museum, 211 W. 21st, Olympia.

Historical sketches of local organizations or interesting individuals will be the focus of this course, which includes step-by-step instruction on how to do historical research and writing.

Prerequisites: None.

Class size limit: 24. Auditors accepted.

FAULKNER: THE CONTENT AND THE TECHNIQUE

Course (1 or 2 Evergreen Units).

Sandra Simon, Member of the Faculty (English), 866-6049.

Tuesdays, 7 - 10 p.m. (all students), and Thursdays, 7 - 10 p.m. (2 unit students only), *Library 2118*.

All students will read two novels — *Light in August* and *As I Lay Dying* — comparing Faulkner's special treatment of history, region, race, story, and myth in the two works. Students enrolled for 1 Unit will be expected to present biographical, autobiographical, and critical readings to the class. Those enrolled for 2 Units will present these readings and do weekly writing exercises in character development, based on the "interior monologue" technique used in the two novels. Students need not be experienced fiction writers but need to have thought about a character they wish to fictionalize.

Prerequisites: None.

Class size limit: 15, 2-Unit students; no more than 25 total.

FILM AS A CULTURAL DOCUMENT*

Course (1 Evergreen Unit).

We will examine the major political, economic and social developments in eastern and western Europe, from the end of World War I to the present. Students will be expected to attend lectures, read a text and a modest amount of supplementary reading, and complete a final take-home examination.

WASHINGTON LABOR AND WASHINGTON POLITICS

Course (1 Evergreen Unit).
Dr. Mathew Smith, Member of the Faculty (Political Science), 866-6242.
Mondays, 7:30 - 10:30 p.m., *Library 3402*. (NOTE: First meeting on April 2.)
Labor plays a critical role in the electoral, legislative, and administrative politics of Washington state. The course will focus on each of these areas, through a series of talks and discussions with leaders of the state labor movement, legislators, and state government administrators. It will provide an opportunity for labor activists and other concerned citizens to discuss the political issues confronting the labor movement today.

WOMEN UNDER PATRIARCHY: LAW AS SOCIAL CONTROL

Credit

All of the Spring Quarter part-time courses offer 1 Evergreen unit (4 quarter hours or 2.67 semester hours) unless otherwise noted. Evergreen requires 45 units for graduation, 12 of the last 24 to have been earned while enrolled at Evergreen. The maximum allowable credit for any quarter is 4 Evergreen units.

Special (non-degree) students may earn up to 2 Evergreen units per quarter. If you wish to register for more than that, you must apply for regular admission through the Office of Admissions. Students who earn 1 Evergreen unit per course may enroll for an additional unit of credit by signing up for another course, arranging for an Individual Contract with a faculty member on a part-time basis, or seeking admission to a Coordinated Studies program or Group Contract which has part-time openings.

A Special Note

TO THOSE INTERESTED IN COMPLETING A BACHELOR'S DEGREE THROUGH PART-TIME STUDY.

To those students wishing to undertake part-time studies at Evergreen to begin or complete work on a Bachelor of Arts degree:

We realize you may need both help and information as you try to arrange a sequence of studies — perhaps unit-by-unit — that will best serve your individual purposes. Those just beginning college have different problems from, say, a person with an A.A. degree from a community college or a person who began undergraduate work several years ago and, for any number of reasons, has interrupted his or her studies. Here are some ways in which we think we can assist you:

Advising/Planning

If you need information about how things work academically at Evergreen or want current information on curriculum offerings, please call Academic Advising (866-6312). This office can be most helpful to you as you decide your course of study.

Admissions Counseling

How do you enroll at Evergreen? What kinds of information does the college need to get you enrolled? How does the college operate for the part-time student? These and many other kinds of "policies, procedures and programs" questions can be answered in the Office of Admissions. Just dial 866-6170 and ask for an Admissions Counselor.

Career Exploration & Placement

Part-time students needing information about career exploration and career planning (for instance, how would a given set of studies relate to a specific career field already being pursued by the student?), coupled with career identification and eventual placement or advancement, should telephone Evergreen's Career Planning and Placement Office (866-6193) and talk to staff members. They have a lot of information and resources at their fingertips and are happy to help you.

Internship Possibilities

Last year over 500 students performed internships in host agencies and organizations through the Evergreen Internship Program. An internship is a carefully designed learning opportunity planned as an integral part of a student's program of studies. Since internships are planned, located, arranged and served primarily in terms of student academic objectives, an intern must be enrolled in either a Coordinated Studies, a Group or Individual Contract program. While most internships are performed by full-time students, part-time options may also be arranged. Student Classification

RESIDENT

Person who has had domicile for other than educational purposes in the State of Washington for one year immediately prior to the first day of a quarter; a dependent son, daughter, or spouse of a federal employee residing within the State; or a dependent son, daughter, or spouse of a college employee.

NON-RESIDENT

Those who do not fit the "resident" definition. (For specific information, contact the Registrar, 866-6180.)

Student Categories

(PART-TIME STATUS): PART-TIME DEGREE SEEKING

Student enrolled for one or two units of credit through continuing academic work leading to a bachelor's degree. Accepted by the Admissions Office as a matriculated student. Receives regular college evaluation.

Persons wishing to immediately begin or continue work toward a bachelor's degree may wish to register as part-time "Regularly Admitted Student," taking one or two units of credit. These students follow regular admissions procedures, which require submission of a full application and transcripts of previous academic work. Those unable to complete the regular admissions process by the start of a given quarter may still apply as a "Special Student" to secure their part-time place at Evergreen. Credits would then be applied to degree work when regular admission is obtained.

An application form for special students is available on page 11. Students wishing to carry more than 1 Evergreen unit (4 quarter hours) may register for two 1 unit courses (8 quarter hours) or for one course and a individual contract in the same area of study. The tuition for 8 quarter credit hours (two Evergreen units) is only \$123 per quarter. This combination of course work and an independent study contract enables students to tailor work more closely to their individual needs.

SPECIAL

Student usually enrolled for 1 or 2 units of credit who receives regular college evaluation. Student may subsequently apply for admission to degree-seeking status, with previous work credited toward the Bachelor of Arts degree.

Those who want to enroll, but have not been regularly admitted by the Office of Admissions may do so as a "Special Student" on the form on page 11. This allows registration without making formal application, supplying transcripts, etc.

Credit for 1 or 2 units maximum earned is applicable to the degree following regular admission, which may be obtained later.

Enrollment as a "Special Student" is a relatively easy matter. Just fill out the form on page 11 and mail it to: Registrar's Office, The Evergreen State College, Olympia, WA 98505.

Program Definitions

Evergreen offers credit for part-time students in four basic ways:

COURSES:

Studies focusing on specific subject areas. All courses generate 1 Evergreen unit unless otherwise indicated. Nearly all Evergreen courses meet in late afternoon and evening hours and are specifically designed to serve the needs of part-time students.

COORDINATED STUDIES:

Team-taught programs which examine major problems, or themes from the perspective of various academic subjects. These programs operate at both beginning and advanced levels. Part-time students may arrange to participate in a portion of a Coordinated Studies program for academic credit.

GROUP CONTRACTS:

Group Contract Studies involve the intensive examination of specific subjects such as economics, arts, marine biology, and sociology to name but a few. Groups include from 15-20 students working with one or two faculty members. Again, part-time study opportunities exist in some of these programs, with students taking less than a full academic load to earn credit.

INDIVIDUAL CONTRACTS:

Where single students work one-to-one with faculty sponsors on a specific academic assignment — normally involves advanced, full-time students. However, some part-time students with advanced expertise may be able to negotiate these kinds of individual programs by making special arrangements with faculty members.

Degree Requirements

Students must earn a minimum of 45 units of Evergreen credit in order to complete their Bachelor of Arts degree. Students transferring from another college must earn at least 12 Evergreen units before becoming eligible to receive their Evergreen diploma. One Evergreen unit is equivalent to 4 quarter hours or 2.67 semester hours.

Evergreen will accept a maximum of 33 TESC units as transfer credit from another college (equal to 132 quarter hours or 88 semester hours). The maximum amount of credit that can be transferred from two-year colleges is 23 units, equal to 90 quarter credits. Transfer students should supply transcripts of all previous work when they apply for admission. The Admissions Office will evaluate transfer credit and supply students with a report after they are admitted.

The flexibility of Evergreen's study modes adapts to a wide variety of individual needs and situations. These range from classroom instruction to independent study to internships.

Paths To Your Degree

Evergreen's academic policies make it possible for degree students as well as those considering degree work to use part-time studies as one vehicle toward the Bachelor of Arts degree. To find out more about integrating part-time studies into your degree plans, contact the Office of Academic Advising, Library 1200, 866-6312, or the Office of Admissions, Library 1200, 866-6170.

Evaluation

At Evergreen students are evaluated in written narrative by their faculty. Their written evaluations are added to their Official Transcripts which are kept in the Registrar's Office. For each unit of credit or block of units, students will have at least three documents: an official description of their program or contract; an evaluation of their performance by their faculty member; and a statement by the students themselves evaluating what they feel they have learned.

Credit For Prior Learning

There are two sources of possible credit for prior learning outside formal educational institutions: the College Level Examination Program (CLEP), and External Credit. Both may be used by students to accelerate their progress toward a degree, thereby recognizing credit-worthy but heretofore unaccredited achievements in learning.

Students interested in CLEP should contact the Registrar's Office (866-6180). They may be eligible to take tests in designated subject areas and earn up to two units of credit per examination. Students should be especially careful to determine their eligibility for CLEP before taking any exams.

Evergreen has established an Office of External Credit to assist older students returning to college who have work or independent study experience which may merit academic credit. External Credit staff will help students document their experiences so they can demonstrate competence and petition for academic credit. Such credit will not be granted for attainments which have already been recognized by awards of credit elsewhere. Summary statements on the external credit policy and procedures are available, and students who believe they may have experiences which could generate credit should check with Prior Learning Programs (866-6072). Up to one year of academic credit may be earned by this process.

Support Services

Part-time students may take full advantage of Evergreen's excellent undergraduate library facilities. In addition to quiet study spaces, the library houses a collection of more than 160,000 hard bound volumes, another 23,000 books and periodicals in microform, plus reference materials, serials and documents, maps, charts, art prints, audio recordings, models, films, videotapes, slides, and rare books. Complete library privileges are extended at no extra charge. Part-time students also will find a complete range of supplies and academic books and materials in the College Bookstore, main mall of the College Activities Building.

Bus Transportation

The Evergreen campus is served by the Inter-City (public) Transit System weekdays when the quarter is in session. Buses leave downtown Olympia from Fourth Street and Capitol Way (15 minutes past the hour, 7:15 through 11:15 a.m., and at five past the hour, 12:05 through 5:05 p.m.), traveling via Harrison and Division Streets, and arriving in Parking Lot C on campus twenty minutes after departure. Buses depart Parking Lot C (25 minutes before the hour, from 7:35 through 11:35 a.m. and 12:35 through 5:35 p.m.), traveling again via Harrison and Division Streets, and arriving at the Fourth Street and Capitol Way bus stop 20 minutes later.

The TESC Van provides transportation between downtown and campus weeknights and on Saturdays. The van follows the same route as Inter-City Transit. Service is offered from the downtown stop every hour on the quarter-hour, from 6:15 through 11:15

p.m., weeknights; and every hour on the quarter-hour, 12:15 through 5:15 p.m., Saturdays. The van leaves campus every hour on the hour, 6 through 11 p.m., weeknights; and every hour on the hour, 12 noon through 5 p.m., Saturdays.

NOTE: The college is considering an expansion of evening and weekend bus service. Watch the Cooper Point Journal and campus bulletin boards for changes Spring Quarter.

Housing

Evergreen has a limited number of apartments for students, staff and faculty. Facilities include studio apartments; two, three and five-bedroom units in large complexes; as well as 38 two-bedroom duplexes. All units are fully furnished.

Housing also includes smaller one and two person studio rooms with

access to a community kitchen adjacent to the studios. Prices vary from \$71 per month per person to \$392 per month for a five-bedroom unit; rates depend on the type of unit and length of contract. All utilities (except phone) and parking and FM-TV cables provided at no additional cost.


