## College errs in giving killer a forum

On behalf of the Washington State Law Enforcement Association, I wish to express my deepest disappointment in The Evergreen State College's decision to allow convicted police murderer Mumia Abu-Jamal to speak Friday (via audiotape) for its commencement ceremonies. Honoring someone who murdered a police officer while he was serving the public is unconscionable.

We are grateful to Gov. Locke's wisdom and leadership in bowing out of an opportunity to address the graduating class. He recognized this as a situation in which
