# Co is for Counter-Culture: Experiencing Punk Brianah Droubay

When looking at the term "Punk" what comes to mind? Is it a fashion? A culture? A type of music? Maybe it's just the grimy kid sitting on the side of the street smoking a cigarette in a studded vest. When going through an exploration of punk music you begin to realize and understand that it is not just a song, it's a statement. In every chord there is a story, in every word spoken there is a history. The deeper you get into this type of counter-culture the more you understand what things like Anarchy for the U.K. really mean. Establishment controlling society to the point of forcing the development of this counter-culture is where punk really came from. It wasn't music; it was a movement against the establishment.

# Beginnings: Anarchy for the U.K.

In the beginning, punk music derived from a time in the United Kingdom somewhere between 1974 and 1976 when massive unemployment rates gave birth to a movement that was up raised by music from the standpoint of someone who was living in poverty because of the control the establishment posed upon everything. In 1977 the only studio recorded album produced by the Sex Pistols was released and entitled *Never Mind the Bullocks, Here's the Sex Pistols*, the release of this album made a statement to society and to the government that things needed to change. One of the most recognizable and possibly the most famous was Anarchy for The U.K. This was a pivotal kick off to the punk movement in the way that it stated perfectly clear that the everyday people of society did not want the government to have the amount of control that it had. Strict regulation on media as well as rising unemployment rates

played a huge part in keeping the musically oriented revolt alive against the establishment. The biggest factor I can see that seemed to be a huge part of the punk movement was when unemployment fully swept through the U.K. it was soon regulated; the people would use something called a ub40 form so they could collect unemployment benefits. But by the way unemployment benefits were designed was that they didn't calculate by the amount of ablebodied unemployed workers in the household, it was only the head of the household who collected the money. So you can see how poverty was thrust into the U.K. and without a good future for the growing youth they became angry and very anti-establishment because of what it had done to directly affect their lives.

#### 7. Converse and Reflect

## Punk as a conversation

Like, who is to say I can't graffiti this wall because its public property, if it is not offensive and it is a statement of art, a beautiful mural, why is it illegal? I am starting to believe that Society has become lazy and caught up in so many different distractions that they no longer wish for their freedom.
